There's a memorable scene in Kleber Mendonça Filho's magnificent Aquarius where an older woman at a staid birthday party looks at a piece of furniture and recalls when she had passionate sex on top of this innocuous console. She smiles — only she knows the carnal connection. The brief sequence makes us see that every space and object hold within them associations that can be individual

or collective; they are ghostly presences in our lives, sometimes to embrace, at other times to recoil from. Their powerful hold on our memory is the key to his movingly elegiac docuessay *Pictures of Ghosts*, a selfnarrated journey through the director's hometown of Recife, from the apartment he grew up in that's played a major role in many of his films to the city's cinema houses. *Full Review*




THE POT AU FEU

TERRESTRIAL VERSES

VERDICT: A fresh and angry look at Iran today approaches the country's malaise in a series of black comedy skits that pit ordinary citizens against a wide range of bureaucratic authorities.

We all know the pain of a close encounter with a petty bureaucrat who has the power to make life difficult for some nonsensical

reason, based on White Rabbit logic guaranteed to drive the victim mad. Multiply that by a factor of ten and welcome to

contemporary Iran, where young co-directors Ali Asgari and Alireza Khatami describe the surreal moments of everyday life in Tehran with infallible humor and barely hidden outrage in Terrestrial Verses (Ayeh Haye Zamini). A must-see for Iranwatchers, these sardonic skits hit the bull's-eye of a repressive Big Brother society that tries to regulate the most private matters of its citizens, from religion to love for one's pet. After its bow in Un Certain Regard in Cannes, this short 77-minute comedy is bound to be a hot crossover date for Films Boutique.

Though it looks like it was made with more dash than cash, the film is cleverly lit by cinematographer Adib Sobhani to describe the numerous Kafkaesque situations in which ordinary Iranians are treated with scorn and arrogance. Full Review

POWER ALLEY

VERDICT: Brazilian newcomer director Lillah Halla makes a film full of zest and empathy about a talented volleyball player that resonates in today's pro-choice panorama.

"This is a new world," Brazilian director Lillah Halla announces joyfully in *Power Alley (Levante)*,

her film debuting in Cannes' Critics Week. It's a world in which female volleyball players with the CE Leste club make locker room jokes, dance naked in the shower, and challenge each other to make a "menstruation mask". You get the idea. The coach is revolutionary because she includes a transgender player. They are young, athletic, and independent. But then again, not completely.

The best player in the group, 17-year-old Sofia (Ayomi Domenica), is announced as the main contender for a sports scholarship, on the same day she discovers she's pregnant. The pregnancy is the product of a casual relationship, a notch above a one-night stand. "The boy with the motorbike" is how we know him. Keeping the baby doesn't even cross Sofia's mind, but abortion is illegal in Brazil.



NO LOVE LOST

VERDICT: Erwan Le Duc conjures a stylish and swoony look at the quick flame of first love and the lingering, unresolved pain of heartbreak.

"At the beginning, Etienne is twenty. He suspects nothing." Those narrated words kick off the dazzling five-minute opening sequence of Erwan Le Duc's hearton-sleeve No Love Lost in which Etienne (Nahuel Pérez Biscayart) meets Valérie (Mercedes Dassy) in the middle of a protest, where together they slip out of the clutches of the cops, fall in love, have sex the same night, and nine months later welcome a child into the world. Then one day Valérie drives off without a word, leaving him and the baby, never to return. In this stylish and swoony Critics' Week Closing Film, Etienne is about to learn that life's unsuspecting surprises aren't just for the young.

If first love is a quickly struck flame, the search for closure is a door that never shuts. We jump ahead sixteen years and Etienne has seemingly put his past behind him. "You can't love someone absent...you give up on that love, and it vanishes," he declares. It's a mantra that's set to be challenged as his daughter Rosa (Céleste Brunnquelle) is preparing for college, while Etienne looks ready to settle down with Hélene (Maud Wyler). But when a faint, wholly unexpected opportunity arises to reconnect with Valérie, the past comes racing back to the present forcing him to face feelings he's shelved but never fully reconciled with.

Whimsically directed by Le Duc, and recalling the playful work of Jean-Pierre Jeunet and Michel Gondry, No Love Lost is a film that never stays still. The filmmaker loves keeping the bodies of his cast in motion, particularly the lanky Biscayart, whose physical adroitness is just as light as the film's airy tone. The production design is equally sprightly, with rooms boasting primary colors and pastels that run in parallel with costume designer Élisa Ingrassia's tie dyes and patterns. Full Review



European Film Promotion Elects New Board of Directors

The 37 national film institutes of European Film Promotion (EFP) elected a new Board of Directors at today's General Assembly during the Festival de Cannes. The Board consists of seven members, with their term of office lasting for two years.

Five of the current members remain on the Board, including Simone Baumann, Managing Director German Films, as new Vice President, Daniela Elstner, Executive Director UniFrance, Eda Koppel, Head of Marketing Estonian Film Institute, Stine Oppegaard, Manager International Relations Feature Films, Norwegian Film Institute, Markéta Santrochová, Head of Czech Film Center, who has been re-elected as EFP President. Newly elected to the Board are Christian De Schutter, Managing Director of Flanders Image and Rastislav Steranka, Director of the National Cinematographic Centre of the Slovak Film Institute.

"As member of such a great European network, I am delighted to serve another term on the EFP Board and am very honoured to have been re-elected EFP President", says Markéta Santrochová "It is a privilege to continue our many constructive debates on the Board with colleagues representing such diverse and rich experiences. I am very proud indeed of this network. We have realized that we can initiate and make a lot of things happen together. It is even more gratifying to being able to exchange ideas again on site at festivals after the pandemic which has bonded and united us even more. With our targeted programmes such as PRODUCERS ON THE MOVE in Cannes, EUROPEAN SHOOTING STARS in Berlin as well as the Film Sales Support funding programme for world sales companies, EFP promotes European films and talent outside of Europe with a highly motivated team under Managing Director Sonja Heinen."
